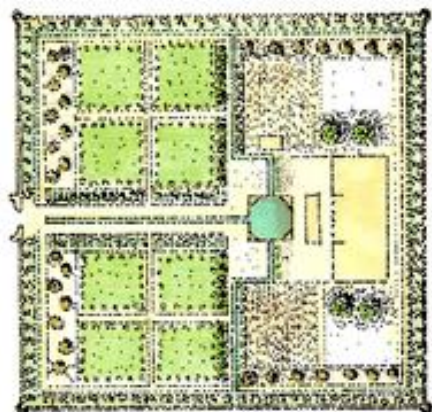

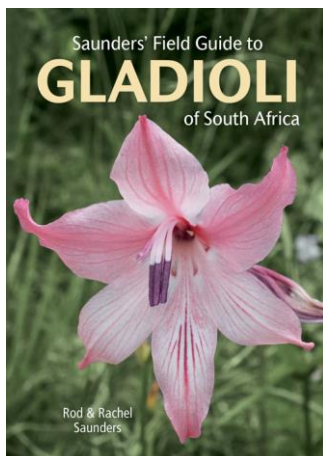
Stellenberg garden in Cape Town

A new book about gladioli



Saunders' Field Guide to Gladioli of South Africa, published by Penguin Books, is the first to offer a complete photographic record of the 166 species that occur in the country. Posthumously completed, this book is the culmination of the Saunders' long search to find and photograph every known species of gladiolus in South Africa, home to more than half of the world's gladiolus species.

The book was launched by a [video](#) which includes an overview by Rupert Koopman of the conservation status of gladioli and a presentation by Dr John Manning, botanist and author of *Field Guide to Wild Flowers of South Africa*.

WHAT IS IT?

In this topic, photographs of unusual plants, fruits, seeds or garden tools will be shown without the caption and readers are asked to identify them. The answer will be given in the following newsletter. Contributions should be sent to [Roland Leclercq](#).

The "What is it?" in the August Newsletter was *Banksia burdettii*. This beautiful plant that grows in Pierre's garden near Perpignan is native to Australia. This *Proteaceae* blooms with orange spikes in late summer. It is resistant to drought once installed and down to -5 ° C.



The photo of the new "What is it" is sent by Alfredo Unda from Chile. You will probably guess the genus, but the species, little known in France, is more difficult to find. What a beauty !

Convolvulus sabatius, the ground blue-convolvulus or blue rock bindweed, is a wonderful ground cover. It is very beautiful in full sun in a rock garden or at the top of stone walls. Native to the Mediterranean, this perennial is covered with lavender blue flowers all summer and part of autumn. It is an easy plant that grows in all soils. It tolerates drought but appreciates some watering. Invaluable in our gardens.
